

Zoltán Fónagy (CSc 1999) started his career in history at the ELTE Faculty of Humanities where he taught Hungarian history in the 19th century. Since 1996 he has been a research fellow and then a senior research fellow at the Institute of History of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. He spent a year in Göttingen as a guest at the Max Planck Institut für Geschichte by DAAD scholarship, where his interest in everyday life is deepened. He received his academic title for his thesis on the relations of noblemen's properties in the 18th century. (Published as a book: *A nemesi birtokviszonyok az úrbérrendezés korában. Adattár. 1–2.* MTA BTK TTI. Budapest, 2013) His book was rewarded with Academy Award for Youth and Peter Hanák Prize. He wrote various summaries of the history of the 19th century, which is intended for the public or university education. Many of these works were also published in foreign languages. He published studies and chapters of books about the 1848-49 War of Independence and the 19th-century economic and social history of Budapest. His own book was published about Miklós Wesselényi, István Széchenyi and a summary of the second half of the 19th century. Between 2003 and 2009 he worked as Deputy Director of Science at the Collegium Hungaricum in Vienna, and since 2004 as Director: His work was recognized by Knight of Cross from the Order of Merit of the Hungarian Republic. His research topics are mainly the history of society and culture, to which he likes to approach the method of historical anthropology. From 2017 he worked on the critical edition of István Széchenyi's correspondence. His commitment to historical dissemination is manifested in a number of articles and lectures. This is indicated by his blog with many readers, which is entitled *The History of Everyday Life*.
