

**Judit Majorossy** (PhD 2006) is currently a member, a lecturer and researcher at the *Institut für Österreichische Geschichtsforschung* (Institute of Austrian Historical Research) at the University of Vienna, and until 2019 was a collaborator on the VISCOM project of the Austrian Academy of Sciences (<https://viscom.ac.at/project-team/late-medieval-central-europe/>). Her research mainly focuses on the various, diverging issues of late medieval and early modern urban, social and church history, comparative urban and social history, late medieval social topography and usage of urban space: and within these wider topics her publications are basically concentrated around the everyday religiosity of urban people, endowments, donations, lay confraternities, pilgrimages, hospitals and poor care, urban elites and their family and kin relations, the possibilities of reconstructing the social topography in late medieval Hungarian towns and that of investigating the social and family networks (among the urban elites). She had previously also taken part in the work of several research project teams: The Role of the Elite in Early Modern Urban Leadership and the Social Network of Its Members, Fifteenth-Seventeenth Century (Dr. István H. Németh OTKA, 2007-2010), The Sources and History of the 1515 Habsburg-Jagiello Royal Summit in Vienna (Dr. István Tringli OTKA, 2012-2017), Hungarian Atlas of Historic Towns (Dr. Katalin Szende OTKA, 2016-2019). Her last closed individual post-doctoral projects were: Space and Society in Late Medieval Pressburg (OTKA, 2008-2011) and Space and Society in the Late Middle Ages – Social Topography in a Comparative Perspective (Münster/Budapest, 2009-2010). She had received a Marie-Curie doctoral fellowship, a Zoltán Magyary post-doctoral scholarship and was awarded a two-year an Alexander von Humboldt scholarship at the *Institut für vergleichende Städtegeschichte an der Westfälischen Wilhelms-Universität* (Institute of Comparative Urban History at the Westphalian Wilhelms University) in Münster. She is the co-editor of the Korall Hungarian Social Historical Journal ([www.korall.org](http://www.korall.org)) and the member of the editorial board of the *Urbs: Hungarian Yearbook of Urban History*. She received the Péter Sahin-Tóth award (2006) as well as the Richard Plaschka prize of the Austrian Academy of Sciences (2008). Previously she had worked as a scientific librarian (2000-2008), as a historian-museologist and head of science (2012-2015), and as an external university lecturer (ELTE, 2012-2014). She is the author of several Hungarian, English and German articles, published late medieval German source editions and she is the editor of numerous volumes. Her two monographs (*Piety in Practice. Urban Religious Life and Communities in Late Medieval Preßburg (1400–1530)* – Medievalia/VISCOM Books, and *Die funktionale Elite mittelalterlicher Pressburgs* – QIÖG Reihe) are in preparation together with two other edited volumes by the Brill Publishers (*Practising Community in Urban and Rural Eurasia, 1000-1600*, and *Towns as Living Spaces in East Central Europe: Static and Dynamic Aspects of Late Medieval Urban Communities*).
