

Deáky, Zita, ethnographer, PhD 2000; habilitation 2011. As of 1 January 2013, she has been a habilitated associate professor at the Ethnographic Institute of Eötvös Loránd University Faculty of Humanities. She obtained her university doctorate in 1994 with her thesis entitled *The Midwife in Hungarian Folk Society in the 18th–19th Centuries* (published 1996). She published her PhD dissertation entitled *Official and Traditional Healing in Hungarian Historical Sources in the 18th–19th centuries* in 2000 and her habilitation thesis, “*Good Little Boys and Girls*”: *The Historical Ethnography of Early Childhood in Hungary*, in 2011. Her main fields of research include the culture of midwifery and birth in the 19th and 20th centuries, the historical ethnographic questions of early childhood and child work, and the social ethnography of the peoples living together in the Carpathian Basin. On these she has published numerous studies, book chapters and monographs. In 2005, she co-authored with Lilla Krász *The Beginning of All Things: The Cultural History of Birth in Hungary (16th–20th Centuries)*. She published her *The Work of Children and Adolescents in Hungary from the 19th Century to the Second World War* in 2015.
